Make sure you make time to address your basic physical needs, for example, walking for a certain amount of time each day.

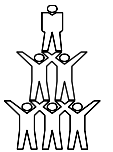

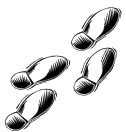

4. Practice relaxing.

For many people, the changes that come with depression - no longer keeping up with our usual activities and responsibilities, feeling increasingly sad and hopeless - leads to anxiety.
