

## We will be discussing commercial tobacco, not traditional use of tobacco When discussing tobacco and nicotine use in this training we will be focusing on commercial tobacco. Traditional tobacco is and has been used in sacred ways by American Indians for centuries. It is tobacco and/or other plant mixtures grown or harvested and used for ceremonial or medicinal purposes. Commercial tobacco is mass-produced for profit by companies with addictive nicotine for recreational use. It contains chemical additives and is linked with death and disease. 



# TTS Code of Ethics A tobacco treatment specialist will strive to maintain the highest level of professional competence and professional and personal conduct and will: Respect the privacy, dignity and culture of all individuals and ensure fair and equitable treatment of all individuals. Provide people with all relevant and accurate information and resources so they may make their choices freely and intelligently. Observe principles of informed consent and confidentiality of individuals.



- After reviewing, ask if participants have any examples of ethical dilemmas they have faced and how they were handled.
- Suggestions for discussion:
  - Your client has begun to ask personal questions of you and asks to follow you on your personal social media accounts.
  - You disagree with the care given to your client by another provider, and you tell your client why the provider is wrong.
  - Your client tells you that she is being treated by a licensed therapist for a behavioral health disorder, but she would prefer to work with you on those issues because you "seem to understand." You do not have training as a counselor/therapist.
