Barre Family Health Center Fact Sheet

BACKGROUND/HISTORY:

The Barre Family Health Center was originally founded in 1973 with a mission to better meet the needs of the underserved population of Barre and nine surrounding communities, and to provide a site for Family Medicine training for the University of Massachusetts Medical School.

The original health center was located in the center of town on the Harding Allen Estate in what was once a carriage house, but had outgrown the space by 1980. In 1984 the center moved to a "new" building in the current site which was expanded in 1996. Having outgrown that 8,000 sq. ft. facility almost before it was completed, our current Health Center was built with the help of federal, community and medical center support and opened in July of 2007

We see 40,000 patient visits per year (Resident patients comprise >11,000)
