Focus Forward: Nursing Pioneers Celebrate GSN's First 25 Years

THINK CRITICALLY. Create opportunities. Advance nursing education and research. GSN's leaders and key contributors reflected on the school's founding and exponential growth to national prestige in just 25 years, during an anniversary celebration and panel discussion, "Look How Far We've Come (and How We Got Started)," held October 19.

In its short twenty-five years, the Graduate School of Nursing has accomplished more than many schools accomplish in twice that time. school's initial vision and growth, reflecting on the challenges and accomplishments while sharing personal, unique perspectives in helping to shape what has become a resource in nursing excellence for all of Massachusetts. The GSN's first dean upon its 1985 establishment, Dr. Kathleen Dirschel, worked to build the school from the ground up—everything from developing the curriculum, to recruiting an entirely doctorally prepared faculty, establishing admission standards

passage of the national exam that will license them as registered nurses and the transition into the master's level course of study. The students sealed their accomplishments and evolution as compassionate, expert nurses by reciting the program's pledge, committing themselves to provide care when needed, elevating the standards of the nursing profession and embodying the integrity expected by their peers and patients. "The accelerated GEP model meets patient and health care needs with an exciting, innovative and effective approach," said Eileen Terrill, PhD, assistant professor of nursing and director of the GEP



The school has shaped nurses and nursing practices in Central Massachusetts and across the region in a significant and strategic way. The next 25 years will surely be filled with many more innovations and initiatives in response to dynamic changes in the health care industry and the changing role of nurses.

HRSA Funds Bolster Specialties with Shortage of NP Providers

GSN STUDENTS COMMITTED to working in medically underserved urban and rural communities may be entering the primary care workforce sooner, thanks to a recent \$760,000 grant from the Health Services Resource Administration (HRSA). The grant funds GSN's Adult Gerontology Primary Care and Family Practice Care Nurse Practitioner students for one to two years. In some cases, students can accelerate from part-to full-time study so that they can enter the workforce

as advanced practice nurses sooner and improve patient care. "Our focus will be on funding those students who are economically or educationally disadvantaged, from underrepresented groups in health care," said Kathleen Miller, EdD, GSN, associate dean for advanced practice programs. With the critical need to expand the primary care workforce under national health care reform, this grant gives GSN students an opportunity to train for and enter the field faster.

Alumni Profile | Dawn Carpenter, DNP, ACNP-BC

For Dawn Carpenter, DNP, ACNP-BC, completing her doctorate in nursing practice was just the beginning of her journey—to advancing patient care and helping to keep the GSN on the cutting edge of national nursing trends.

As a manager and nursing supervisor at

Rhode Island Hospital, Dr. Carpenter yearned to return to clinical care and completed a post-master's certificate through the GSN at UMass Worcester in 2003, which led her to work in the surgical ICU at UMass Memorial Health Care. "It was clear from the very first phone conversations I had with people at UMass that it was a natural fit for me," she recalls. "There is a palpable difference from other programs. People are approachable, available for questions, and they went above and beyond to help me succeed."

The collegial, supportive environment Dr. Carpenter originally discovered at the GSN led to her decision to return to the program to pursue a doctoral degree. Dr. Carpenter is one of the first four nurses to earn a DNP through GSN's program and is now committed to nursing education as well as clinical care. Shortly after being awarded her doctorate in spring 2010, Dr. Carpenter assumed her faculty position as

assistant professor and coordinator in the acute care NP tract, which she has added to her full-time position as critical care nurse practitioner in UMass Memorial Health Care's surgical ICU.

Today Dr. Carpenter is committed to GSN and the importance of the GSN Alumni Fund. "It keeps us on the cutting edge of where advanced practice is going," she says. "GSN is aligned where nursing is going nationally, and we're at the leading edge. There is a clear methodology to building programs in a sound and optimal way, doing so in the most cost-conscious way by seeking grants to help make nursing education affordable for everyone."
