SDH: While it is a work in progress, a discussion of how social determinants of health impact the retention of people from diverse backgrounds in clinical trials will be incorporated into the clinical trial self-study module. Health Systems Sciences: We have been not yet been able to identify a clear session that is relevant to HSS, but it may be possible to incorporate some of the basic principles of HSS into the introductory POP session, or the self study clinical trials module and the self study IRB approval session. We will continue to think about this topic and how to best address it our course. Additionally, Dr. Zitzewitz, upon the suggestion of Max Rosen, has also been working with Rick Jacobs to discus plans for an optional evening forum on clinical trials, which would include a the patient perspective on accessing a clinical trial and the industry perspective on clinical trial development. Again this is a work in progress, but may occur in October if it can be arranged in time. In future years for POP, the clinical trial session will likely be incorporated into a small group session to allow more discussion of each of these priority areas.
