Next Steps

Now that your child has received a diagnosis of Autism Spectrum Disorder, we hope this information will be helpful to you in understanding the diagnosis, and the first steps you should take to get your child the services he/she will need.

1. For children under 3 years of age, give the diagnosis letter we are giving you to your early intervention therapist. (If your child is not enrolled in EI, we will help you do so)

For children over 3 years of age, give a copy of the report to your child's school and request an IEP evaluation/meeting, and/or update

- 2. Call the Autism Resource Center for your area and complete an intake. This is a great resource which offers a wider range of services and support. Use this link to find the center in your area:

- 3. If you need help with information related to insurance call the Autism Insurance Resource Center at 774-445-4056 or visit https://massairc.org/. You may also access their online tool "Am I Covered" at https://amicovered.disabilityinfo.org/
- 4. Use the list of providers given during your visit to arrange for ABA or any other services the doctor recommended. Remember many of these services have waiting lists, so the sooner you can get your child on a wait list, the likelier you will receive services in a reasonable time period.
- 5. Your child qualifies for services through the Department of Developmental Services with the autism diagnosis. This may or may not include Social Security Disability Income (SSI).
