Chancellor's Award for Advancing Institutional Excellence in Diversity and Inclusion



Congratulations, Sharina Person, PhD



Chancellor's 2024 Award Winner for advancing institutional excellence in diversity and inclusion Chancellor Michael Collins announced on Wednesday and had these kind words to share about Dr. Person: Shining example of a medical school community member who honor's Dr. King's legacy and encapsulates what our advancing together, brand looks like in practice. This award is bestowed annually upon an individual or group exemplifying the medical school's DEI values, which includes building an inclusive culture, increasing access and equity, improving cultural competence and advancing health equity. Dr. Person is clearly a tour de force who contributes profoundly to diversity, equity and inclusion at the institutional community and national levels. Her national impact

is pervasive. Given her position as president of biometric section of the American Statistical Association, as well as her development of the Diversity Engagement Survey in partnership with the American Association of Medical Colleges. This survey, thanks to Dr. Person tireless work has become an incredibly important resource for academic medicine, and to date the survey has been administered to 170,000 respondents at more than a hundred institutions across the country. The results of the DES are helping medical schools and academic medical centers to improve and indeed transform a variety of areas from institutional wide and DEI specific mission and vision statements to admissions hiring and promotion processes and practices. The DES not only enhances UMass Chan, national stature and our leadership profile, but it also makes our institution better, stronger and more welcoming. Here at UMass Chan Dr. Person has become synonymous with the DES and she has played an instrumental role in disseminating the most recent findings from our 2023 survey at high profile venues, including virtual Town Halls and our Diversity Summit. Through her determined, detailed and diligent efforts to collate, summarize and communicate our results. Dr. Person has provided us with a framework of consistently measuring and improving our culture and climate, and directing our efforts toward those areas that require attending. She undoubtedly is used as a trusted resource, passionate advocate and a content expert by our academic community. Schools, departments and offices call on Dr. Person frequently to help them understand the granular details of the survey as well as implement improvement plans. Her home department PQHS is among them and the chair of the department's diversity action committee. Dr. Person is positioning PQHS as a leader in adopting and promoting DEI related best practices. Should come to no surprise that Dr. Person is also sought after mentor for students and faculty. She generously shares whatever little free time she has to support, advocate on behalf of and serves as a role model for our learners and colleagues alike. She's further committed to supporting the goals and aspirations of younger generations of students who hope to enter the Health Science professors.



Speaker: Garrett Ash, PhD; Assistant Professor of Medicine, Biomedical Informatics, and Data Science; Yale School of Medicine

Description: Learning to exercise with type 1 diabetes requires that standard guidelines be followed up by trial-and-error lived experience. Our Type 1 Diabetes Digital Exercise Support platform provides exercise guidance, motivation, and multimodal biometric feedback in a closed loop where the feedback supports the guidance and motivation. The study is also capturing real-

time surveys of affective motivation states for activity and rest to study their relationship with glycemic variation and fear of dysglycemia. Finally, we have several quality improvement (QI) projects integrating this model into the Veterans Affairs Healthcare System to treat other chronic diseases. BLACK HISTORY MONTH: FEBRUARY (awarenessdays.com)

Happy Lunar New Year! Chinese Chunjie, Vietnamese Tet, Korean Solnal, Tibetan Losar, also called Spring Festival, are all typically celebrated in China and other Asian countries that begins with the first new moon of the lunar calendar and ends on the first full moon of the lunar calendar, 15 days later. The lunar calendar is based on the cycles of the moon, so the dates of the holiday vary slightly from year to year, beginning February 10 and ending on February 20. unemployment. The <u>United Nations General Assembly</u> has decided to observe 20 February [2] annually, approved on 26 November 2007 and starting in 2009, as the World Day of Social Justice. The Declaration focuses on guaranteeing fair outcomes for all through employment, social protection, <u>social dialogue</u>, and fundamental principles and <u>rights</u>.
